Introduction

Charlestown School began working on the five-year School Improvement Plan in the Winter of 2019. The process involved not only the members of the School Improvement Team, but also community members and the staff of Charlestown School as we examined where we are and where we want to be in the next five years. Several Team Members participated in the writing of Vision 2023 as members of the District Strategic Planning Committee.

In the winter of 2019 we began the process of developing our goals by first examining our previous School Improvement Plan and the successes or failures we experienced as we implemented that plan. We found that we had met or exceeded most of the goals.

We recently received the rating of 4 out of 5 STARS under the new Rhode Island Department of Education School Accountability System. Previously, we were rated "Commended" for four consecutive years under the-previous RIDE Accountability System. We continue to hold a high ranking when compared with other districts in surrounding Southern Rhode Island Districts. Our goal is to be rated 4 or 5 Stars under the RIDE Accountability System.

Action Steps	Ongoing and focussed review of all student data

Consistent use of the RTI and IEP process to support students with greater academic and social emotional needs
Review of student attendance data, partnership with parents and fidelity with the district attendance policy
Provide students with access to appropriate technology to capture student work and assessment data.
Increase and maintain vertical alignment in curriculum across the district and emphasize planning for transitioning students from grades 4 to 5.

Priority 2: Infrastructure: Healthy, safe and flexible environments		
Outcomes	Charlestown spaces will be inviting, healthy, flexible, and spacious enough to accommodate class sizes that support students to be engaged, collaborative, and active participants in their learning.	
Measured By	Results from required state surveys and feedback shared by staff, parents and community members. Review of data collected for attendance, report cards, office referrals, class placement, specialty school enrollment, and learning walks.	
Action Steps	Explore flexible seating options and possible funding sources. Increase school wide use of Responsive Classroom and Zones of Regulation. Provide students with opportunities for movement throughout the school day. Increase use of the Outdoor Learning Spaces to enhance learning.	

Priority 3: Voice and Choice for Students and Staff	
Outcomes	Increase student choice in learning and opportunities for students to showcase their learning for peers, parents and the community.

	Create a personalized system of professional learning for staff.
Measured By	Staff surveys after professional learning.
	Observation of student showcases.
Action Steps	Continue to provide opportunities for students to participate in blended and personalized learning.
	Facilitate student showcases of student work shared with members of our learning community, at least annually per grade level.
	Explore and increase methods to share student work with parents using digital platforms.

Priority 4: Global Citizenship	
Outcomes	4th graders will demonstrate proficiency on world language assessments.
	Increase access to diverse cultural experiences and perspectives at the regional, national, and international levels.
Measured By	Review of World Language Assessment data.
	Increased global and cultural learning experiences inside and outside of the classroom.
Action Steps	Create additional partnerships with schools, businesses, and community organizations that further global and cultural opportunities for all students.
	Continue to support cultural assemblies funded by the school PTO.
	Review Instructional resources and materials to reflect and increase cultural diversity.

Outcomes	Further develop Outdoor Classroom Spaces and Materials
	Increased personalized learning experiences for students.
Measured By	Student showcases, report cards, lesson observations, classroom visits, learning walks.
Action Steps	Promote personalized learning through flexible scheduling and increased community involvement.
